President's Piece March 2024

This February in Texas was one of the most unpredictable weather months of the year. We hit the 90's and the 20's, sometimes within 24 hours. You might leave the house wearing a comfortable cotton tee shirt and need to run home at noon to pick up your parka. These wild swings in temperature made me think about a unique type of quilts – Temperature Quilts!

If you are unfamiliar with this term, a temperature quilt is a type of quilt that uses different colors or patterns to represent different temperature ranges. The quilt is made by creating a block for each day of the year, using fabrics that correspond to the high and low temperatures for that day. The result is a visual representation of the year's weather patterns.


To create this type of quilt, first decide on the temperature range you want to represent. Typically, each color corresponds to a specific temperature range (e.g., blue for cold, red for hot). Aim for at least 15 different colors to make your quilt interesting.

Create a color key by assigning colors or patterns to temperature ranges. A span of three to six degrees per color is a good starting point. Customize this based on your region and preferences. Now here is where it gets tricky in Texas. You might want to choose only certain months of the year to avoid having a whole section (representing June, July, August and even September) of only oranges going to red flame colors. Of course, it is up to you what time frame you wish to represent.

A typical temperature quilt can be created by making a total of 52 blocks, each representing a week. Each block will have slots for 7 colors (patterns), representing the 7 days of the week. Blocks may be square, on point, contain triangles, etc.

You can start charting daily temperatures when you begin making your quilt and finish it up a year and two weeks from then. Another option is to look back at historical weather data to highlight a special year or event. You could even choose to use two different states such as Texas and Minnesota and use the same time frame but alternate rows for more dramatic color shifts. Do your own thing! Some examples are shown below.



Circle of Friends with Dana Jones

March 2024 — <u>Seats Still Available</u>! Sign up with Donna Gregory at the Guild meeting Tuesday!

There are a few spots left for our Circle of Friends workshop with Dana Jones. A surprisingly simple technique for insetting circles using Cheryl Phillips' Cut-a-Round tool. You'll master insetting circles into blocks and circles into circles using just eight pins per circle no matter the size. You'll make the first block for this quilt in a few hours. Then you'll perfect the technique so by the end of the class, you'll have multiple blocks done — perhaps enough for a table runner. You'll know how to continue making blocks for as large a quilt as you want.



Community Outreach Plans for 2024 — Sher Harnish

2024 Donation Start-Up: Our goal for donation quilts in 2024 is 560 quilts. Although we typically exceed this, we're never sure how many QOVs might be awarded in any given year or how many National Adoption Day quilts will be needed. This can cause our donation number to fluctuate, so we establish a goal that's within reach. So far this year we've distributed 46 quilts, with 20 more ready to go to Graduating Seniors next month.

Graduating Senior Quilts: As a Guild, we signed up to donate 10 quilts for senior high school students in foster care who are graduating in May. Guild members and others have been very generous - we have 20 large throws/twin-sized quilts to donate! We strive to make these quilts gender neutral so that they can be used with any graduating senior. Kim Martin, Region 3 Coordinator for the Graduating Seniors Project, will be at our March meeting where the quilts will be on display. Come see what we've been able to contribute to this worthy cause.

What's What? Members have asked what's the difference between the Guild Initiative, the Kid Kwilt Challenge, and a Guild Challenge. Here's the scoop.

Each year we present a **Guild Initiative** at an early DQG meeting. This is a simple block that all members of the Guild are invited to make. We supply the pattern/instructions and ask that you use your own scraps to make as many of the blocks as you like. This is a fun activity for both beginners and experienced quilters. We collect the blocks at each meeting then Kids' Bee assembles them into scrappy tops that become donation quilts. You'll see a couple of our recent bowtie block quilts in the display for Graduating Seniors. We get blocks from members and friends of members - anyone can contribute blocks toward the Initiative.

The **Kid Kwilt Challenge** is an annual activity open to members. Often, we offer a FQ of fabric which must be incorporated into a finished quilt. OR, as we did this year, a pattern that must be used or adapted to build your finished quilt. These quilts are due at the November meeting and are displayed at the December Holiday Potluck. Those who participate are eligible for a drawing for a sewing machine donated by the Denton Sewing Center, as well as gift certificates from various local shops. Any member can take part, prizes are given out.

The **Guild Challenge** involves making a small wall hanging art quilt based on a designated theme. This is open to any member, and typically has an early Fall deadline as these art quilts are displayed for the public at the Denton Arts and Jazz Fest in October. The finished works are also displayed at the next DQG meeting for members to see. On occasion, these Guild Challenge pieces may be displayed to the public elsewhere. This activity is particularly popular as it allows an avenue for artistic, creative, imaginative work outside the realm of traditional quilting.

Storybooks and Quilts To Go — Sarah Schermerhorn

The guild was contacted by a lead teacher at the UNT Center for Young Children in February to help them learn more about their studies on fiber, particularly quilting. One of our storybook projects, The Piñata Quilt, was the one that they requested. I delivered the quilt and <u>The Piñata Quilt</u> book to the 3, 4, and 5 year olds' lead teacher, Ms Seda Turk, for her to read to her class and show them the quilt. She and I discussed an activity for her class to do "hands on" and I returned a few days later to talk about how quilts go together and I showed them a baby quilt that I had made recently. They then each made a small 4 patch, choosing from precut squares I brought with me. We layered them, discussing each layer as we went. I took them home, sewed them together and returned that afternoon with their finished little "mini quilts"! Seda told me they had been excited all day about seeing what I would bring back to them.

It was a really fun day for me and a whole new group for our Community Outreach!

April Workshop Spotlight – Donna Gregory

Our April Workshop is Diane Murtha-Modified Quilt-As-You-Go

Diane says: "Think of this technique as two-step quilting. This class yields 25 perfect 4½" quilted blocks embellished with a variety of appliqué options, then assembled. Quilting thru each block and batting individually makes quilting easy for both new and experienced quilters alike – no bulk or awkward struggling with a large sandwiched quilt. A great project for increasing accuracy, as well as small space quilting, like retreats, or for me, my RV! Add backing fabric and the second step, quilting, and you are done. This technique can be used to create any size canvas that can be appliquéd in endless options. So much fun!"
