The Quilts of Valor Foundation has given over 300,000 quilts to veterans and folks, it's all done by donations. We are very blessed to wrap veterans in their Quits of Valor.

Community Outreach — Partners in Giving — Sher Harnish

Partners in Giving: DQG Community Outreach maintains partnerships with several non-DQG Bees & groups who contribute through our guild with donation quilts. The Material Girls of Robson Ranch is one such hybrid group of DQG members and non-members. At least 8 of our DQG members are involved with the Material Girls of Robson Ranch and I want to acknowledge their contributions, not only to DQG but to their other causes.

Between 2023 and now, Material Girls also made 50 quilts for Seven Stars Foundation, a group that sends children of military members to YMCA camps, the closest in Ardmore, OK. Quilts also went to current military members in overseas hospitals through the American Hero Program. These soldiers have been severely wounded and will be stabilized, then sent home to military centers including Washington, California, Texas, and others. Many more quilts have gone out to individuals with mental health difficulties. Three MG quilts were pulled from the general inventory because they were ideal for individuals who had been blinded and who appreciate quilts that are very tactile due to design and quilting. In a thank you from the AHP, the program wrote that these three recipients love to share that they feel every square and stitch. The wife of one tells that her husband is going to wear his quilt out running his hands over the shapes and stitching.

A prolific group of quilters, the Material Girls supports these organizations in addition to donating finished quilts and tops to the Denton Quilt Guild. Last year, MG contributed over 200 Christmas stockings, 14 finished quilts, 21 tops and they also bound 41 quilts for DQG. Our thanks to Material Girls of Robson Ranch for their support of our Guild's Community Outreach efforts.

Butterfly Challenge: Patterns for this year's guild-wide challenge are available for pick up at Kids Bee, June 3 at Minding My Ps & Qs, at the next meeting or by contacting Prissy Roberson or Sher Harnish. Your finished butterfly wall hanging is due at the September meeting and will be displayed at Jazz Fest in October. (Instructions also in this month's newsletter)

Slab Block Initiative: These 12 1/2" scrappy blocks will be accepted throughout the year. Simple to make, they're a great scrap buster. Instructions on our website and in Facebook. So far the Kids Bee has assembled 5 quilt tops and we have enough slabs to make another 5 or 6. Keep those blocks coming! Drop them off at any meeting or at Kids Bee, the first Mondays at MPQs.

Kids Bee: This Bee is open to anyone who wants to work on donation quilts for newborns to nursing homes. We're adept at completing/modifying/combining UFOs. Meets every first Monday 10a-4p at Minding My Ps & Qs Quilt Shop. Bring your machine and lunch or snack. For Kids Bee members, the July meeting will be at Sher's house so we can make backs (you wouldn't believe the number of tops we have waiting in the wings!)

Green Valley School Day Retreat Fund Raiser

This was so much fun, supporting the Green Valley Historical Society, and their restored schoolhouse that allows volunteers to work on Quilts of Valor.

Many thanks to everyone who pitched in to make this a successful fundraiser! We donated **\$3,679** to the Green Valley Historical School! ~ Cathy Poethke

Culling your stash? Leaving a quilt legacy? A Note From Sher —

Maybe it's the demographic of our guild members. Maybe it's a Spring Cleaning holdover. Or maybe it's thinking ahead and realizing there's not enough time left to finish all the projects you've set aside or use all the fabrics you've collected. Recently several guild members have asked if or how the guild could use their stash.

When you make a donation, we sort through and set aside yardage for backing or for piecing tops. Small scraps might be combined with other donations to make kits. UFOs and commercial kits are usually passed on to Kid's Bee for finishing. Orphan blocks are collected and made into wonderful scrappy quilt tops. Patriot fabrics are passed along to our two Quilts of Valor Bees. Children's fabrics and juvenile prints might go to the CASA Bee.

Every bit of your donation will be used, with most of it returned to the community through the Guild's outreach donations of finished quilts and holiday stockings. Some large items like sewing tales, machines, furniture, or specialty rulers may go to Quilter's Consignment; each quarter we get a check from QC for the items that have sold through this shop. Patterns, small tools & gadgets, kits and books generally go to the surplus sale. Our next sale is November 19-20. We'll take donations up to the week before the sale. All these bring needed funds to the Guild which pay for our meeting space and speakers, as well as community outreach projects, and help get your stash into happy new creative hands.

If you're thinking about downsizing your stash, contact Sher Harnish or Prissy Roberson in Community Outreach (their info is in your directory). Drop offs are at Sher's house, just text before you come. You can also drop items off at Minding My Ps & Qs any time during business hours. If you have too much to carry or drop off, call for a pick up. If the job seems overwhelming, we can come to you to help you sort and cull your stash. We've done this with several of our older members who report feeling relieved and satisfied that their legacy donation is being put to good use.

So if you're thinking about what happens to your stash after you're done quilting or just wanting to do a little decluttering, now's a good time to start.


The 2024 Butterfly Challenge

The Basics:

Open to all Guild members. Due at the September 2024 meeting.

Make a 15" finished quilted block using the pattern provided as a guide.

This pattern is a starting point only; your design does not have to match this exactly. In general, try to approximate the outer borders of the overall butterfly components and wings. However, you can elongate wing tips, add or remove spots, resize or reposition wing panels, or add 3-D effects.



Your finished butterfly must fit within the 15" block and have at least a 2" margin of space around it. Bind or otherwise finish the edges. Add a 3" hanging sleeve.



The Details:

Use any technique, any color palate, any fabrics, any materials.....

.....appliqué, fusible, needle turned, raw-edge.....

.....fussy cut fabric for wings or spots.....

.....embroidery, thread painting, decorative stitching....

.....beading, crystals, buttons, floss or ribbon.....

.....Piping, painting, metallic thread...

.....possibilities are endless....

Printed pattern (15 x 15) available at DQG meetings through August.

Blocks will be displayed at the Fall 2024 Jazz Fest, also at the guild's December 2024 Holiday Potluck, then returned to owner.
