When I had only been a quilter for a couple of years and a good friend of mine had just discovered quilting, we decided that a good way to build our stash would be to go on a "Shop Hop". We only hopped to about 5-6 shops and had acquired much more than we had expected so decided to call it quits. Pre-COVID I also participated in two Quilt Shop Hop Bus Tours again exceeding my budget but having a wonderful time. Since then I resisted temptation until this January at a retreat with the same friend involved in my first hop. We decided to prepay for the All Texas Shop Hop Directory and Passport.

This was to be a two-month event including 105 shops throughout Texas. Needless to say our plan was not to visit all 105 shops.

Things were very busy for both of us in March and we forgot all about shop hopping. But as April began the hopping idea took hold. My friend hopped first with a couple of her other friends. Then we set out together and visited five shops in a day covering quite a few miles. This was the beginning of "shop hop fever".

I formed a plan to draw an arbitrary circle, with Denton at the center, to encompass all participating quilt shops within a one and a half hour drive from Denton in any direction. For two weeks I planned my daily trips, once with another friend and the rest of them on my own. It was a real adventure and I met so many nice shop owners and fellow quilters along the way. Each shop has its own flavor and fabric collections vary greatly. I found some new tools, new patterns and of course new fabrics. Everywhere I went we talked about quilt techniques, colors, designs and shared photos and stories of quilting adventures.






I help make the quilts as well as the Christmas stockings that the teachers love and fill at Christmas

"Take the challenge"— like Diane Murtha encouraged us to do at our April meeting —-try something new! Find your muse.


